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Introduction

Access to government information is a cornerstone of open, transparent, and accountable government. However, people can sometimes find it difficult to locate information or navigate the different access schemes and terminology used across jurisdictions.

The new Access to Information icon was developed to address this challenge by providing a single, clear and recognisable visual cue that helps people quickly find information held by government agencies.

The icon has been endorsed by the **Association of Information Access Commissioners** (AIAC) and is for use across Australian Government, state and territory agencies.

Key messages

What is the icon?

The Access to Information icon is single, consistent symbol for use across government agencies and jurisdictions.

The selected design features a hand holding the universal 'i' symbol, representing:

- information (recognisable 'i')
- access and disclosure (information being offered)
- support and enablement (the guiding hand)
- user agency (information in the user's hands).

The icon acts as a clear, visual cue helping people quickly locate information held by government agencies.



Key messages

Why does it matter?

The icon make access easier for people to access government information by:

- addressing inconsistent terminology (FOI, RTI, GIPA and other access schemes)
- reducing reliance on prior knowledge of legislation and government processes
- providing a consistent, recognisable entry point across government websites.

The icon supports open government by:

- reinforcing an open-by-design approach
- improving the visibility of proactively published information
- helping ensure information is not just available, but easy to find.

The icon helps create a more consistent user experience by:

- establishing a shared visual language across agencies and jurisdictions
- strengthening recognition through repeated use
- reducing confusion across different government systems.



Key messages

Where should the icon appear?

For maximum recognition, agencies are encouraged to display the icon consistently. It is recommended that the icon appears on the agency's home page, preferably within the website footer, where users can easily locate it regardless of which page they are viewing.

What can users find when they click on the icon?

The icon should link to a dedicated landing page that explains the different ways people can access to your agency's information. Depending on the agency, this may include information about:

- Administrative access arrangements
- Freedom of Information (FOI) requests
- Disclosure logs
- Information Publication Scheme (IPS) information
- Proactively released information
- Agency publications, reports and data
- How to contact the agency about information access
- Processing times and fees (where applicable).

The landing page should serve as a central access point for information held by the agency and help users understand the most appropriate access pathway for their needs.

Frequently asked questions

Is the icon replacing Freedom of Information (FOI)?

No. The icon helps people find information access resources more easily. Existing legislative schemes remain unchanged.

Will every agency's landing page be the same?

No. Agencies can tailor their landing page content to reflect their information holding and access arrangements.

Is the icon mandatory?

The icon has been endorsed by AIAC and agencies are encouraged to adopt it to promote a consistent user experience.

Where should agencies place the icon?

Preferably on the website footer and homepage to maximise visibility and consistency.

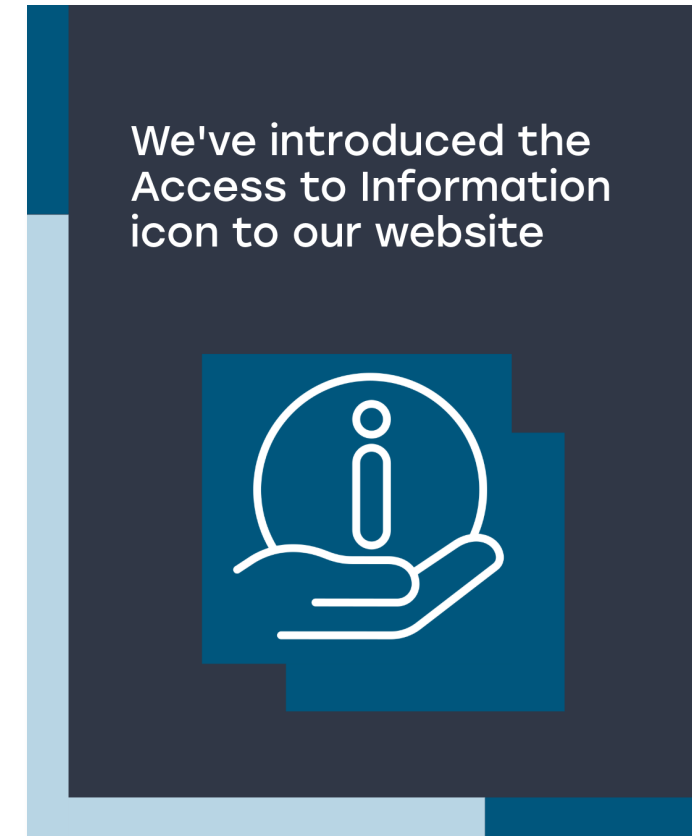
For each social media tile, we have provided a suggested caption.
